Key Question 1: What are the key concepts for most Hindus?	explore the story from the Mahabharta, the 'man in the well' <a href="http://www.indianetzone.com/50/man_well.htm">http://www.indianetzone.com/50/man_well.htm</a> create a piece of artwork based on the story which shows the atman trapped in the physical body and wanting to escape the terrible dangers but the human is distracted by the trivial pleasures instead of trying to get out. This conveys the message to Hindus that they should pay attention to finding the way to escape the cycle of life, death and rebirth.
	This sets the scene for learning about karma, samara and dharma
Key Question 2: What is karma?	Karma is the law of cause and effect and how actions bring good or bad karma. Read the Sadhu's blessing and discuss what it means. https://iskconeducationalservices.org/HoH/further-information-and-teaching-resources-primary/concepts-stories-further-information-and-teaching-resources-primary/p-the-sadhus-blessings-karma/
	Samsara is the cycle of life, death and rebirth (links to the Sadhu's blessing story) travelled by the atman through various reincarnations to reach moksha (release from the samsara cycle and for many Hindus the goal of union with Brahman.) This is seen as liberation or

salvation by many Hindus.

Play a game of snakes and ladders linked to the Hindu ideas of karma and moksha. https://www.hinduismtoday.com/modules/wfchannel/index.php?wfc\_cid=35

Reflect on how these beliefs offer reasons why many Hindus might try to be good- to gain good karma and a better reincarnation and ultimately release from samsara.

The 4 aims are called purusharthas

- Dharma- religious or moral duty
- Artha- economic development, providing for family and society by honest means
- Kama- regulated enjoyment of the pleasures and beauty of life
- Moksha-liberation from the cycle of birth and rebirth/reincarnation

Create posters to promote these.

Compare these with the children's own goals for living.

## Key Question 4: What are the 4 aims of life for Hindus?

Connect these with the idea of karma-pursuing these aims contribute to good karma; doing things selfishly or in ways that harm other living things brings bad karma.

Hindus might describe life as a journey towards moksha. They also have different stages (ashramas) each with different duties.

## Unit Assessment: What helps Hindu people as they try to be good?

Through a Philosophy for Children session:

How might different people respond to this idea, including non-religious responses and how might the children respond themselves.
