Infection Control Fund 25% Allocation

25% of the Grant may be used on other Covid19 infection control measures including domiciliary care and wider workforce measures. There are no restrictions on how this can be spent except that it must be spent on infection control. As with the rest of the grant, it will be paid in two tranches.

These wider measures could include, for example, additional financial support for the purchase of PPE by providers or by the local authority directly (although not for costs already incurred) or measures the local authority could put in place to boost the resilience and supply of the adult social care workforce in their area in order to support effective infection control.

The total of the 25% allocation is £579,147. Some key principles that need to be considered in the way in which Oldham uses this funding are:

- Ongoing PPE requirements
- Staffing implications, including paying staff their normal wage (ie occupational sick pay rather than statutory sick pay) and backfill costs for staff absent as a result of Covid-19
- Provider resilience and recovery
- Ongoing need to ensure timely hospital discharge
- Consideration of direct payment funded provision (this includes personal assistants)
- Consideration of communal care and living environments where effective infection control is more challenging
- Market share and capacity available

Taking these principles into account, the remaining 25% of the Infection Control Fund is allocated as follows:

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The rationale for distribution is as follows:

- Care at home weighted to the 10 main cluster lead providers who will need to support hospital discharge and admission prevention.
- Supported Living/Extra Care Housing/Shared Lives weighted to recognise that in Holly Bank and Extra Care Housing Schemes, self-isolation, in self-contained apartments eases infection control challenges, compared to communal living in the rest of the supported living sector and Shared Lives.
- Direct payment recipients £100 to support recipients in their role as employer, provide PPE to their carers.
- Day services recognises the cessation of services thus far during the pandemic but the need for appropriate infection control measures, including PPE, social distancing measures etc as services step back up. It includes commissioned and non-commissioned services, for older people and those with a learning disability.
