

Greater Manchester safeguarding children procedures updates

Oldham Safeguarding Children Partnership (OSCP) adopt the Greater Manchester standardised safeguarding procedures, reflecting current guidance and best practice across the region. These procedures are set out in the [Greater Manchester Safeguarding Procedures Manual](#)

Policies updates December 2025 highlights:

- [Children of parents with learning difficulties/disabilities](#) – Updated following recent legal judgements; professional support now led by Research in Practice.

Spotting child exploitation: join the #LookCloser campaign

Across the country, young people are being manipulated, sexually abused, and coerced into activities such as money laundering and drug dealing. Child exploitation is rarely obvious, but it happens everywhere. By understanding the signs, each of us can play a part in stopping it.

Through The Children's Society's [#LookCloser campaign](#), delivered in partnership with British Transport Police and the National County Lines Coordination Centre, they are working to raise awareness of child exploitation and how to report concerns.

The Children's Society are hosting [free learning events](#) running from January to March 2026. These sessions are designed for professionals, businesses, and members of the public who want to deepen their understanding of child exploitation, improve their ability to spot the warning signs, and learn how to take action.

Government consultation: proposed Child Protection Authority

On 11 December 2025, the government announced plans to create a new [Child Protection Authority \(CPA\)](#), a national body designed to strengthen accountability across the child protection system, identify emerging threats, and support consistent good practice among safeguarding partners. This follows findings from the independent inquiry into child sexual abuse (IICSA) and the Casey audit into grooming gangs.

The government is now consulting on the CPA's proposed functions, governance and how it should work alongside existing bodies. The CPA is intended to be an expert, evidence led organisation that brings greater clarity, unity, and continuous improvement to multi agency child protection. Children and families, frontline practitioners, local authorities, inspectorates, professional bodies, and safeguarding organisations are encouraged to respond.

Responding to harmful sexual behaviour

Children display a range of normal, healthy sexual behaviours as they grow. When behaviours fall outside this range and could harm the child or others, they are considered harmful sexual behaviour (HSB).

[**Oldham's HSB protocol**](#) has recently been updated and should be used whenever there is any suspicion, allegation or observation of a child or young person displaying harmful sexual behaviour or being at risk of doing so.
